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Probably the most obvious way by which Americans have been trained to give up their God given rights has been by tricking them into believing that they need to pay a fee and purchase a license (beg permission) from their State in order to travel on the road by automobile. If a band of thieves can convince a person that “it is OK” to make them pay money to move from “point A” to “point B”, then making them pay for any other free rights will easily follow (marriage, dog, or hunting licenses, etc)

How serious is it that Americans do not realize that they are NOT free any more on the continent their Christian forefathers tamed and settled? Here's how bad it is: A war was fought in 1776 for independence from a dictatorial King of England who had trampled the American colonists' rights into the ground. But as badly as King George of England abused the colonists with harsh and unlawful demands he never once charged them a fee to obtain a paper that would give them a privilege to travel on any road in the colonies! Making someone pay money to travel was so unthinkable back then that not even a first class world tyrant would do it! Yet Americans today gleefully run to their State agencies to pay for permission to travel on a road and to obtain a paid license to do so. Is it any wonder that God says of our generation “*My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge*” (Hosea 4:6)

Nobody can force (at least lawfully) another person to pay for a right freely given to that person by God Almighty. This includes breathing, eating, bathing, thinking, --- or moving about (locomotion). It does not matter if you eat with a fork, spoon, or knife, because eating is a free right. It does not matter if you travel by walking, horseback, or automobile – moving about is also free right. Who says so? Gods says so, and so did the original law in America until it got subverted by tyrants and dullards. The Declaration of Independence says that we have a right to “life, **liberty**, and the pursuit of happiness.” The foremost understanding of liberty is the right to freely move about (IE. The right of locomotion) Note what Jesus says about the order of events within His salvation: “*I am the door: by me if any man enter in, (1) **he shall be saved**, and (2) **shall go in and out, and find pasture**”.* (John 10:9) We are freely saved by God from our sins and we are freely given the right to travel where we may as a child of God. No Christian in the Bible was ever told by God to pay for permission to travel anywhere.

What is little known by Americans today is that our early American forefathers and early American laws agreed with that statement of Jesus and the rest of the same that the Bible says on this matter. But when you ask a present police officer or judge about driving you are told “Driving is a state privilege. You need to buy a license”. But that is only because our rights have been stolen from us and sold back to us as “privileges” by the State. Here's what our early American courts once said about driving:

*“A highway is a road or way upon which all persons have **a right to travel at pleasure**. It is the right of all persons to travel upon a road.”(Gulf & S.I.R. Co. v. Adkinson, 77 So.954, 955; 117 Miss.118)*
*“**The right to travel** over a street or highway is a primary **absolute right** of everyone.”(Foster’s Inc v. Boise City, 118 P.2d 721,728)*
*“**The right of a citizen to travel** upon the public highways - - **includes the right** in so doing to use the ordinary and usual conveyances of the day; and under the existing modes of travel includes the right to drive a horse drawn carriage or wagon thereon, or **to operate an automobile thereon**, for the usual and ordinary purpose of life and business.- - The rights aforesaid, being fundamental, are constitutional rights.”TecheLines-Danforth, 12So.2d784,87 (Miss. 1943)*
*“The use of the automobile as a necessary adjunct to the earning of a livelihood in modern life requires us in the interest of realism to conclude that **the right to use an automobile on the public highways** partakes of the nature of a liberty within the meaning of the constitutional guarantees of which the citizen may not be deprived without due process of law.” Berberian v. Lussier, 139 A.2d 869,872; 87 RI 226,231 '58*
